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1. Introduction

This report provides a full set of tables for, and additional methodological information on, the research, The Planning Profession in 2019, published at www.rtpi.org.uk/planningprofession.

2. The datasets

The report draws on four datasets describing the planning profession in the UK. Each has its strengths and limitations which are discussed below. This section also considers how the RTPI datasets were filtered to enable a focus on UK planners and comparison with the ONS data.

2.1 ONS's Annual Population Survey (APS)¹

The APS is drawn from the Labour Workforce Survey plus an additional boost, ending up with a total sample of about 300,000 households. The survey randomly samples addresses, and asks the head of the household to report information about all the individuals who live there. It is published every year, reporting on the period of October-September. This series goes back to 2005.

One of the questions asks about the occupation of everyone in the household (SOC2010 'Main Job'²). Participants must pick from a list covering 369 different occupations, grouped into 90 Minor Groups, 25 Sub-Major Groups, and 9 Major Groups. '2432 Town planning officer' (TPO) falls within the Minor Group 'Architects, Town Planners, and Surveyors'. Other built environment occupations in the survey include, 2431 Architects; 2434 Chartered Surveyors; 2433 Quantity surveyors; 2436 Construction project managers and related professionals; and 3121 Architectural and town planning technicians.

Limitations of the APS in exploring the planning profession

The analysis in this report focuses mainly on responses to the APS where one or more individuals in the household were identified as a Town Planning Officer (TPO). In total this represents about a hundred individuals each year. One hundred TPOs from a robust randomised sample is large enough to give us reasonable confidence about large populations within the data (like TPOs in England or Female TPOs), but less confidence about relatively small groups (like TPOs in Wales or TPOs aged 70+).

We believe the APS is the best available source of statistics on the whole planning profession, however there are issues with using the survey to analyse professional planners, including a relatively small sample size, and a somewhat limited definition of what constitutes a planner (it only includes people who would self-identify 'town planning officer' as their main occupation). In order to minimise the chance of reporting erroneous results, we have generated our estimates by taking an average of the estimates for each of the five years to September 2018, rather than using 2018 figures. We have also rounded estimates to the nearest hundred.

2.2 RTPI Member Survey 2017

The 2017 RTPI member survey received responses from 4225 RTPI Members globally, with 79% (3340) currently working in the UK. As above, in order to enable easier comparison with the APS data we have focused on membership classes which we believe would likely self-identify as Town Planning Officers, leaving us with 74% of total respondents (3243). The survey was sent out by email and post and was hosted online (with login to prove membership). The response rate was 18%. It asked 40 questions covering areas including employment, skills and CPD, and demographic details. This provides additional insight in several of the relevant areas where our main membership records are lacking.

We believe that our Member Survey is reasonably representative of our membership as a whole, with similar proportions of membership classes, genders, regional and national spread, and ethnic diversity. This enables us to use the Member Survey to make predictions about the wider membership. The Member Survey estimates are also close to the APS estimates for the wider sector, suggesting RTPI's membership is relatively representative of the wider planning sector (assuming the APS data is correct). However, given this data is based on RTPI members rather than all planners it is not equivalent to describing the whole sector.

In order to enable easier comparison with the APS data we have focused on UK-based survey respondents which we believe would have been likely self-identify as Town Planning Officers, leaving us with 77% of total respondents (3243) – the 'UK town planning officer' group. We got to this number through the following steps: (1) deleted all respondents who were not chartered, associate, licentiate, or affiliate, (2) deleted all respondents whose only employment status was unemployed, retired, or student, or where their other employers were not in planning (3) removed all respondents who are academics who did not have a planning job role or employer, (4) deleted all respondents working outside the UK, (5) checked the employer and job role of all affiliate respondents and deleted those not in planning roles, (6) deleted all respondents for whom a text search identified 'career break' or 'unemployed' elsewhere in the survey.

It is important to note that this filtering means the statistics published in this report may not match ones published elsewhere as the latter focus on the whole international membership rather than this UK town planning officer group.

2.3 RTPI Membership records

RTPI holds data on all its members. This data is richer in some areas than others, but we have data for almost every member on gender, age, region, nation, and age. We do not currently have sufficiently robust data on the employer of every member. All reference to membership records in this report relate to the membership as of January 2019.



To enable comparison with the APS analysis in this report focuses on UK-based members in membership classes which we believe would be most likely to generally self-identify as Town Planning Officers (Chartered, Fellow, Associate, Licentiate, and Affiliate). This means the analysis focuses on 17,361 members.

This enables us to relate findings about UK RTPI members in these classes with high confidence, however we cannot use this sample for many of the areas considered in this research. And given not all planners are RTPI members this data is not equivalent to describing the planning sector as a whole. It is important to note that this filtering means the statistics published in this report may not match ones published elsewhere as the latter focus on the whole international membership rather than this UK town planning officer group.

Members for whom data was missing for a particular area were excluded when calculating percentages.

2.4 The EU Labour Force Survey (EU LFS)³

We used European Commission data from the EULFS to describe the built environment in the EU. The EU LFS is a large household sample survey providing quarterly results on labour participation of people aged 15 and over as well as on persons outside the labour force. Like all surveys, it is based upon a sample of the population. The results are therefore subject to the usual types of errors associated with sampling techniques. However, based upon the sample size and design in the various Member States, Eurostat implements basic guidelines intended to avoid publication of figures which are statistically unreliable. This means no estimates are given where they are considered very unreliable, and estimates are marked with a "where they are of low reliability.

The EU LFS also looks at various built environment occupations. However, it uses a different classification system (although still one which correlates with the UK SOC2010 codes). The EU LFS uses 4 digit ISCO occupational classification codes, which include 2161 Building Architects (corresponds to SOC2010 2431 Architects in APS); 2164 Town and traffic planners (corresponds to SOC2010 2432 Town Planning Officers in APS); and 2165 Cartographers and surveyors (corresponds to SOC2010 2434 Chartered Surveyors in APS). The EU LFS also contains information on other built environment occupations, some of which are not specifically included in the UK's SOC2010 codes (e.g. including 2162 Landscape Architects).⁴
