

#### The judges' comments:

An exciting and clearly transformative project that represents a significant benefit to Stockport town centre and shows commitment to partnership working over an extended period of time. Notable benefits include the safe and accessible environment, Viaduct Park, step free access, links to the town centre and sensitivity to the iconic Stockport Viaduct. The climate benefits are also notable, particularly the commitment to reducing embodied carbon and providing the largest blue roof outside of London. The community engagement was excellent and far reaching, including through delivery.


#### The judges' comments:



#### The judges' comments:

Judges described Luston Wetland as a truly pioneering scheme demonstrating the collaboration of multiple stakeholders, tackling the issue of nutrient phosphate pollution and unlocking stalled housing projects in River Lugg catchment which can be an excellent lesson learnt for other parts of the UK.

### **Excellence in Planning for the Natural Environment Commended**

#### West Cumbria Pipeline submitted by Lake District National Park Authority / United Utilities

#### The judges' comments:

Judges commended this entry as they thought it was a well-executed project. Judges acknowledge the West Cumbria Pipeline was one of the largest feats of engineering undertaken by United Utilities and the largest project of its kind in the country at the time. It remains by far the most significant and technically complex planning performance agreement delivered by the Lake District National Park Authority.


