Why is it an issue?

- 1) Time
- 2) Professional credibility / accessibility
- 3) Clear understanding of case



Who are you writing for? The Inspector

- Reasonably intelligent
- Grasp of planning law & guidance
- > A specific job to do
- Unfamiliar with the context



Focussed, effective & efficient means...

- 1) Is a statement needed at all?
- 2) Don't give lectures on Planning law
- 3) Focus on the relevant policies
- 4) Focus on the relevant parts of national guidance




Concerning your case itself...

- 5) Tackle the points of contention (the Reasons for Refusal?)
- 6) Avoid unnecessary repetition, description & history
- 7) Make all your points count
- 8) Don't argue 'dead causes'
- 9) Be prepared for the Inspector disagreeing

Reasons for Refusal 1

The applicant has failed to demonstrate that the **noise** levels arising from the development will not be increased over and above the ambient levels, a situation which it is considered will cause undue harm to the residential amenities of the adjoining residential properties. The proposal is therefore considered contrary to Part 8 of the National Planning Policy Framework 2012; Anywhere Town Local Plan Review Policies ST1 and HG5 and the Anywhere Town Publication Local Plan Policies SD1 and SD2.



Reason for Refusal 2

The omission of a walled treatment to the boundaries of the access road will severely compromise the visual and environmental characteristics of this locality resulting in material harm to the visual amenity of the street scene and entrance to the development site and to the residential amenities of the adjoining residents. Accordingly, the proposal is considered to be contrary to Parts 7 and 8 of the NPPF 2012; Anywhere Town Local Plan Review Policies ST1 and HG5 and the Anywhere Town Publication Local Plan Policies SD1, SD2 and SD13.
