

 Suitable mitigation measures can ensure that proposals achieve "nitrate neutrality".




Consenting processes – update & challenges





Consenting regimes & stakeholders

- Consenting regime determined by geographic location/nature & scale of development
- Planning Act 2008/Town & Country Planning/Marine & Coastal Access Act etc.
- Interface between different consenting/permitting/ licensing regimes
- Relationship between law & policy

Nationally Significant Infrastructure Projects v Town & Country Planning Developments

- Application to Secretary of State for Development Consent Order for Nationally Significant Infrastructure Projects (NSIPs): energy; transport; water; waste; waste water; business and commercial
- "One stop shop": planning permission, compulsory acquisition, highways, marine licences, environmental licences
- Front loaded process extensive formal consultation
- Rigid timetable post submission
- Determine in accordance with any relevant National Policy Statement
- Examination in public then report to Secretary of State for decision
- Limits on post DCO amendments

- Application for planning permission to local planning authority where development proposed
- Separate applications to relevant bodies for compulsory acquisition, highways, marine licences, environmental licences
- Formal consultation post application
- Timetable not prescribed
- Determined in accordance with development plan policies unless material considerations indicate otherwise
- Decision delegated/planning committee/PINS on appeal
- Greater scope for post permission
 amendments

Environmental Impact Assessment (EIA)

- A process to ensure that decision-makers have full information on likely significant environmental effects before determining an application for consent for development and take this information into account in making the decision
- EIA assessments are part of the planning balance consent can be granted even if likely significant adverse effects are predicted
- NSIPs: The Infrastructure Planning (Environmental Impact Assessment) Regulations 2017
- TCPA: The Town and Country Planning (Environmental Impact Assessment) Regulations 2017




Environmental Statement: practical issues

Habitats Regulations Assessment

- In contrast to EIA, the outcome of the HRA process can determine whether or not consent for the proposed development can be given
- Multi-stage process of up to 4 stages depending on outcomes
- Until 12 April 2018 mitigation measures could be taken into account in determination of likely significant effect



Mitigation measures – moving from appropriate assessment into IROPI

- CJEU in Case C-164/17 Edel Grace and Peter Sweetman v An Bord Pleanala – measures can only be taken into consideration in an appropriate assessment when they will guarantee that there will be no adverse effect on integrity. Compensation measures can not be included
- Distinction to be drawn between protective measures forming part of a project and measures aimed at compensating for the negative effects of a project on a protected area
- IROPI must be demonstrated in every project where a negative appropriate assessment applies, which will result in an IROPI assessment regardless of the outcome of the measures for compensating for adverse effects



Post grant of planning permission or DCO

- Risk of judicial review or statutory challenge to lawfulness of decision to grant permission or consent
- Any work undertaken by developer at risk in event of a successful challenge
- Risk tends to lead to more voluminous assessments at EIA stage
- If material changes to project or environment then additional EIA or HRA processes may be engaged where a project requires multi-stage consents



Avoiding silos – de-risking projects to maximise delivery

- Grant of a permission or DCO is an early stage in the life of a project
- Different business models but common factor: greater certainty means cheaper projects & greater market access
- Important in balancing public v private interests that decision- making is transparent & policy is clear

Some observations from the front line

- The sustainability and delivery of projects is improved where:
 - Legal processes are clear, logical and affordable
 - Planning policy is stable, evidence based and supported
 - Objectives are coherent and aligned
 - Thresholds are not arbitrary
 - Local planning authorities and statutory consultees are well resourced
 - Decision-makers are well informed and appropriately qualified
 - There are clear lines of accountability


