Jan Gehl is Professor (Ret.) of Urban Design at the School of Architecture in Copenhagen. He has been awarded the Sir Patrick Abercrombie prize for exemplary contributions to town planning by the International Union of Architects as well as an honorary doctorate from Heriot-Watt University in Edinburgh. Jan is honorary fellow of the Royal Institute of British Architects, the American Institute of Architecture, the Planning Institute of Australia and the Canadian Institute of Architecture. In 2009 Jan received DOT's Commissioner's Award, for exceptional contribution to NYC Streetscape and the Public Realm. For more than forty years Jan has helped to transform urban environments around the world based on his research into the



ways people actually use, or could use, the spaces where they live and work. In his latest book *Cities for People*, he presents his latest work creating (or recreating) cityscapes on a human scale. He clearly explains the methods and tools he uses to reconfigure unworkable cityscapes into the landscapes he believes they should be: *cities for people*. His lecture will outline this and his thoughts on these can be taken forward
